Caregiver allegedly stole from residents at New Berlin facility

WAUKESHA — A Milwaukee woman allegedly stole cash and other items from at least five residents of a New Berlin assisted living facility while she worked there last year.

Jettie Winslow, 31, was charged in Waukesha County Circuit Court with five counts of misdemeanor theft

and faces 45 months' imprisonment if convicted.

A criminal complaint said residents of the Heritage Assisted Living Center reported cash and jewelry missing in May last year. Records revealed Winslow was working when each theft was reported to have occurred. Pawn shop records

indicate she sold several items that were later claimed by residents to have been theirs; one woman reported nine items of recovered jewelry were hers, the complaint said.

Winslow told police she bought the items from an unknown woman who approached her in a Milwaukee parking lot looking to sell them, the complaint said.

Heritage Administrator Connie Knapp told The Freeman Winslow was fired immediately and the facility has worked with authorities and also taken extra measures to protect residents' safety.

Rash of thefts from cars hits Mequon

Two vehicles also stolen

MEQUON — Mequon police are investigating a recent rash of thefts from unlocked autos — as well as two thefts of autos.

A resident of the 7200 block of West Lafayette Place told police a gray 2016 four-door Toyota Camry was stolen between 9:30 p.m. and 11:15 p.m. June 24.

Keys were left on the floor of the unlocked car. As of late last week, the car had not been recovered, police said.

A 2016 dark gray Ford Explorer was taken from the 8700 block of West Daventry Road between 12:30 a.m. and 6 a.m. Thursday. Police said they believe the

SUV was unlocked. A keyless remote had been left under the driver's seat.

The manager of an apartment complex near 53rd Street and Mill Road in Milwaukee reported finding some items that had been inside the vehicle later the same day. The SUV has not been recovered, police said.

A semi-automatic handgun taken from an unlocked car parked overnight June 22 in the 7200 block of Mequon Square Drive was recovered in Milwaukee after a police pursuit of a stolen car.

Milwaukee police located the 9-mm Sig pistol after a stolen car they were pursuing crashed into another stolen car in the 3000 block of West Townsend Street. Milwaukee police called

Mequon police at 5:30 a.m. June 25 to report recovering the gun.

Here are other thefts from autos investigated by Mequon police:

■ A wallet, about \$250 in cash, a briefcase, a checkbook and ID including a driver's license were taken overnight from an unlocked vehicle in the 7300 block of West Concord Creek Drive. Police were called at 8:30 a.m. June 22. The briefcase and some of the other stolen items — but not the cash — were found lying in the grass June 22 in the 3300 block of West Silver Spring Drive in Milwaukee.

■ A wallet and credit cards were taken from an unlocked car in a driveway in the 11400 block of North Concord Creek Drive between 10 p.m. June 21 and 8 a.m. June 22. Police were

called at 1:10 p.m. June 22.

■ A laptop bag, jacket and gift cards were taken sometime overnight from an unlocked vehicle in a driveway in the 8700 block of West Holly Road. Police were called at 8:45 a.m. Thursday.

■ A plastic bag with about \$2.50 in change was taken from an unlocked vehicle parked overnight in the 11000 block of North Mequon Square Drive. Police were called at 9:30 a.m. June 22.

■ About \$5 in change were taken from an unlocked car in an attached garage in the 11000 block of North Mequon Square Drive between 8 p.m. June 21 and 1 p.m. June 22. The resident told police the garage door had been left down but was standing open when the theft was discovered.

Milwaukee residents arrested on drug, gun charges

WEST BEND — Three Milwaukee residents were arrested Thursday by the Washington County Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Enforcement Group, concluding an investigation involving several controlled purchases of heroin, fentanyl, cocaine and Ecstasy, according to a news release posted on the Washington County Sheriff's Office's Facebook page.

The arrests were made in two adjacent commercial parking lots north of County Line Road in Germantown.

Of the three suspects taken into custody, one has been released with no charges. A fourth suspect is believed to be involved and is sought by investigators.

According to the release, the suspects were delivering 9 grams of heroin to an undercover police officer for \$1,250. Later recovered from the vehicle were an additional 3.7 grams of heroin and 3.7 grams of fentanyl.

Three stolen handguns from Richfield, Milwaukee and La Crosse were also recovered. The Richfield handgun was stolen during a residential burglary in 2015.

Several felony drug charges are being requested against the main suspect for delivery of heroin, cocaine, fentanyl and Ecstasy. Charges will also be requested against both men for possession of the stolen firearms and for felon in possession of

firearms.

"This was a significant arrest for a couple reasons," Sheriff Dale Schmidt said in the release. "With dose amounts at one-tenth of a gram, the quantity is large for heroin and fentanyl deliveries. The amount represents 164 individual doses that was available to opiate users in Washington County."

"Also, with illegal opiate sale tactics being very mobile and anonymous it is difficult to conduct these kinds of investigations. I'm very proud of the work done by the Drug Unit, and appreciative of the ongoing cooperation from the Milwaukee Police Department."

Germantown officers

and Washington County Sheriff's deputies assisted at the scene. Milwaukee Police District 4 officers assisted with seizing a vehicle that was involved in the previous drug deliveries.

The two suspects, ages 25 and 29, remain in the Washington County Jail and are expected to be in court Monday.

"Heroin dealers need to know Washington County law enforcement aggressively investigates and prosecutes drug crimes," Schmidt said in the release. "If you are delivering across Highway Q, we are working a case on you. It's only a matter of time before you are arrested."
