"Paul is a great leader, as good as they come. Thoughts and prayers with him as he recovers," said Alderman Aaron Perry in an earlier tweet today.

Perry said that he hasn't reached out to Decker yet and has been leaving him alone thus far.


Police seek domestic battery suspect

Fled on public transport after incident

WAUKESHA — Police are searching for a suspect who fled on a Metro Transit bus leaving Waukesha after he

was allegedly involved in a domestic disearly Friday morning on the 1000 block of Caroline Street. Nasar



Gregory, 24, of Waukesha has a temporary felony warrant issued for domestic battery, strangulation, disorderly conduct, two counts of child abuse and intimidation of a victim, according to a Waukesha Police Department press release.

Dispatch received a call around 1:21 a.m. Friday morning from a boy requesting police at an address on Caroline Street. What sounded like a child screaming could be heard in the background before the call ended. When officers arrived at the scene a woman, 37, and her three children ages 10, 12 and 17 were fleeing through a lower-level window. They were taken to safety.

The woman later identified herself as Gregory's girlfriend. She told police that Gregory had been drinking that night and when she left their bed to sleep in a different room because she was warm, it set him off.

Gregory allegedly spit on her three times and threw a cup of water on her head in what she thought was an attempt to electrocute her because she had wires attached to her scalp for seizure treatment, according to a criminal complaint.

Gregory also allegedly bit her upper arm, punched her in the chin and tried to strangle her, according the complaint.

Gregory's girlfriend was able to separate herself, gather her children and attempt to leave out the front door. She told police that Gregory blocked their path and started pushing and hitting her children to them back inside, threatening to kill them.



Common Council, which initiated a full review of the proposal after a closed session last month.

Milwaukee originally pulled out of negotiations in 2012 because city officials didn't want to provide water to Waukesha's entire future service area, which extended beyond city limits and enveloped pieces of Pewaukee, Genesee, Delafield and the Town of Waukesha.

Waukesha came back with a letter that said cutting off areas that were part of the water service area was against the law and would not be considered and instead focused on negotiations with Oak Creek and Racine.

Barrett had said he was open to renewing negotiations with Waukesha after the Great Lakes Compact Council ratcheted down the perimeter for future water sales as part of their final approval last year. The amended area was more in line with what Milwaukee initially wanted in 2012.

Oak Creek and Racine have not placed restrictions on the Waukesha water distribution

Bid will go to 'best water provider'

The Waukesha Water Utility has already begun the process of mapping out a water pipeline route that would bring water from a treatment facility in Franklin to Waukesha and has been asking for feedback from residents.

Reilly said that process won't stall during negotiations with Milwaukee, even though an agreement with Milwaukee would require an entirely different pipeline route for water coming into Waukesha.

Duchniak, who is leading the Great Lakes diversion project, couldn't comment on whether having two competing proposals could decrease future water prices, which are estimated to double or even triple for Waukesha residents in coming years. He said the bulk of negotiations are on terms and conditions. such as what services would be included in the rates set by the Public Service Commis-

Oak Creek Mayor Dan Bukiewicz didn't know about Milwaukee's renewed efforts to sell water on Friday, but said that after years of purnegotiations chasing between Oak Creek and

"We imagined Milwaukee would come back around, but at this stage I find it odd," Bukiewicz said. "Naturally we'd like to service the city of Waukesha and we think it's a fair deal that we've diligently worked out.

Duchniak said the city's goal is simply to find the best provider for Waukesha water.

Town of Delavan Police Chief Raymond Clark says the 58-year-old Delavan man who was arrested Thursday faces charges of being party to theft of the animals. But the prosecutor's office says a criminal complaint has not been filed.

Assistant Walworth County District Attorney Matthew Leusink said the man recently told Animal Gardens he was quitting his job and moving back to West Virginia.

Leusink said a woman returned the 7-week-old cats to Animal Gardens on Wednesday. The woman said the suspect had offered her the cats if she wanted them.

The suspect was released on a \$10,000 signature bond Friday.

Company removes beeping alarm clock in wall vent since 2004

ROSS, Pa. (AP) - A heating contractor has removed a beeping alarm clock that's been inside a Pennsylvania family's wall vent for nearly 14 years.

Homeowner Jerry Lynn said he tied the batteryoperated clock to a string in September 2004 and lowered it inside the wall so the beeping alarm would pinpoint the spot he needed to drill for a TV cable. But the clock fell off the string and has been beeping at 6:50 p.m. or 7:50 p.m. each day, depending on whether it's Daylight Savings Time.

The contractors removed the clock through a garage

A corroded battery was still powering the travel clock.

FBI: Flight attendant broke wine bottle over man's head

SEATTLE (AP) flight attendant broke a wine bottle over the head of a man who lunged for an exit door and fought with other passengers during a Delta Air Lines flight from Seattle to Beijing, but it didn't faze him, an FBI agent wrote in charging papers filed Fri-

Joseph Daniel Hudek IV, 23, of Tampa, Florida, was arrested Thursday night after causing the disturbance that forced the plane to return to Seattle-Tacoma International Airport, authorities said.

Hudek was charged with interfering with a flight crew, which carries a possible sentence of up to 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.
