West Allis man charged in online sex sting

WAUKESHA — A West Allis man was charged Monday in Waukesha County Circuit Court after he allegedly traveled to Oconomowoc to meet with whom he thought was a 14-year-old girl for sex.

Cain Okray, 46, was charged with using a computer to facilitate a child sex crime and faces five to 40 years in prison if convicted. He was ordered held on a \$5,000 cash bond, with conditions that he have no use of the internet outside work and avoid contacting any children under 16 other than his own.

A criminal complaint said an Oconomowoc police officer posed online as a child in February, and Okray responded, sending sexually explicit comments and photos over the next several weeks. They arranged to meet at an Oconomowoc store April 14, and officers saw a van like his pass the location several times before receiving a message from Okray asking why there was no girl with the previously given description at that location.

But Okray also made “more erratic and unstable” comments over the past week, including suicidal statements, the complaint in the case said. Police arrested him at his home Friday, where he refused to identify the person with whom he’d been having contact, and said he did make a suicidal comment but was not serious, the complaint in the case said.

He is to return to court Friday.

Man charged after being allegedly revived from overdose

WAUKESHA — A Fox Lake man has been charged after Waukesha police saved him from an overdose in his mother’s basement Sunday, according to a criminal complaint filed Monday in Waukesha County Circuit Court.

Lucas Ludwig, 26, was charged with three counts of possessing a controlled substance, all misdemeanors, and was released after signing a \$1,500 signature bond. He is to maintain absolute sobriety and return to court May 29.

The complaint against him said police were summoned to a house on Glenwood Drive on Sunday afternoon, where they found Ludwig in the basement, his mother standing over him, frantic as she tried to understand the package of nasal Narcan she had; the drug is meant to counteract the effects of opioids. Police administered the drug to Ludwig, who responded within seconds, then became irritated officers were in his mother’s

basement, the complaint said.

Officer found on his person three pill bottles — two were prescribed to him, but the third was from a veterinary clinic and contained Suboxone, clonazepam and Adderall, the complaint said. En route to the hospital, Ludwig told fire personnel he’d overdosed after snorting Xanax mixed with heroin, the complaint said.

Town of Mukwonago man charged after chase

WAUKESHA — Bail was set at \$20,000 cash Monday for a Town of Mukwonago man who allegedly led police on a chase through Muskego early Sunday morning that ended when his vehicle struck a police car.

Shane Mead, 28, was charged with attempting to flee police, possessing cocaine, operating while intoxicated as a second offense, and obstructing police. He is to maintain absolute sobriety and is to appear in court again May 17.

A criminal complaint said a police officer saw Mead’s car speeding near Tess Corners Drive and Clarendon Place and gave chase at about 12:52 a.m. Sunday. Mead extinguished his car lights and lost the officer, but another officer saw his car and resumed a chase that went as high as 60 mph in a residential area before it ended on a cul-de-sac on Coventry Lane. There, Mead drove his car toward a chasing officer’s squad, striking it, and Mead fled on foot but was soon found nearby, the complaint said.

The complaint added a small amount of crack cocaine was found in the area where Mead was arrested, and a police drug recognition expert determined after some field sobriety tests that Mead likely was impaired under the influence of a narcotic and unable to drive safely, the complaint said.

Mead told police he tried to “lose them” because “his probation officer was sick of him having police contact,” the complaint said.

Man charged after allegedly sending explicit messages to girl

WAUKESHA — A Waukesha man who was caught in a car with a 15-year-old girl last fall has been charged after he allegedly sent her sexually explicit videos.

Andrew Derzay, 18, was charged Monday with exposing a child to harmful material and possession of tetrahydrocannabinol, the active component of marijuana. He faces more than 3 1/2 years in prison if convicted. He is due in court May 7.

A criminal complaint said a police officer on patrol last Nov. 19 in the area of Corporate Drive and Executive Place encountered a man and a woman in the rear area of a vehicle, with her apparently straddling him. Both were clothed, but the vehicle smelled of marijuana, and

the officer confiscated a container and pipe with small amounts of marijuana in them, the complaint said.

Investigating further, the officer found that Derzay and the girl had been dating for several weeks. Their phones contained several messages and videos of a frank sexual nature that Derzay had sent the girl despite her age, the complaint said.

Water main flushing has begun

WAUKESHA — The Waukesha Water Utility spring water main flushing has begun.

The annual flushing program, which started Monday, is done each spring to remove settled iron particles from within underground water mains.

Utility customers may experience low water pressure or discolored water during flushing. The utility advises water users not to be alarmed if water looks rusty during or immediately after hydrant flushing, as the discolored water is caused by naturally occurring minerals being stirred up within the water mains.

Should a customer notices rusty water flowing from their tap, they should run cold water until the water runs clear. Only after the water returns to normal should laundry and other water projects be resumed. It may be necessary to run the water as long as five to 10 minutes to clear out the minerals.

The inconvenience which may result from water main flushing should not last for more than a day.

The utility expects to complete the program by the end of May. If problems persist, customers should call the utility’s customer service department at 262-521-5272.

N.B. police looking for dog that bit boy

NEW BERLIN — New Berlin Police are seeking the public’s assistance in locating a dog that reportedly bit a 12-year-old boy on Sunday afternoon.

According to a post on the department’s Facebook page, the incident occurred around 4 p.m. on West Armour Avenue between South Delphine and South Scot drives. The boy was reportedly bitten after the dog, which was on a leash, broke free from its handler. The breed and name of the dog is not known, but the animal is described as medium to large sized with short, brown hair.

The dog was reportedly seen with three adults — a man and two women — who were pushing a stroller and were between 45 and 60 years old. One of the women was a blonde.

The victim may have to go through a series of rabies vaccination protocols unless it is verified that the dog is current on its vaccinations, police advised. Robbery at Oconomowoc Walgreens

OCONOMOWOC — Police are seeking two suspects in a robbery at the Oconomowoc Walgreens early Monday morning.

According to a post on the Oconomowoc Police Department’s Facebook page, the suspects arrived in a silver SUV and entered the Walgreens at approximately 4 a.m.

The first suspect distracted the pharmacist, while the second hopped over the counter and grabbed two bottles of medication. The pair then left the store, entered the silver SUV and

drove away.

The first suspect is a black man, approximately 18-25 years old, with a thin build and hair past shoulder length. He was wearing a “Dale Earnhardt #88” NASCAR black and white colored team jacket with the “Nationwide” Insurance logo on front/back and #88 on the upper left sleeve.

The suspect was also wearing a Pittsburgh Steelers winter hat, light-colored blue or gray faded jeans and gray colored shoes.

The second suspect is a

black man, approximately 18-25 years old, with a thin build, wearing a green and white Seattle Seahawks winter hat. The second suspect wore as well a dark, hooded jacket and a white T-shirt underneath, baggy blue pants and gray Nike athletic shoes with a white swoosh logo.

Alleged sexual assault victim testifies against former Slinger High band director

WEST BEND — The first arguments for and against David Hanke’s innocence were shared with a jury Monday afternoon, followed by the alleged victim taking the stand as the first witness.

Hanke, 67, is accused of sexually assaulting a student nearly 20 years ago. He was the band director at Slinger High School at the time.

“Are you familiar with David Hanke?” Deputy District Attorney Stephanie Hanson asked the victim.

“He was my band director,” the victim, referred to as RAS, said.

During the hearing, it was determined RAS was in the marching band, pep band and wind ensemble, all of which were led by Hanke.

RAS said, “He (Hanke) was very well known and



very well liked.”

It was determined that students

changed in the band room down to their underwear in front of Hanke and the former director had some non-sexual physical contact with students in his office. Students would also regularly have one-on-one sessions with Hanke.

RAS said that during her one-on-ones, Hanke would comment on her breasts. He would say “that they were nice, that I was sexy,” she said.

The event itself is alleged to have occurred in September.

It is alleged that she followed Hanke to his house, drank a beer there and then was groped during a back massage. It’s further

alleged she was assaulted a second time in Oshkosh by Hanke while attending college there.

She eventually reported the alleged assaults in 2016, using her name. She had reported the incident anonymously about 10 years earlier.

When questioned by Hanke’s attorney, William Mayer, RAS had to reaffirm more than a dozen times that the assault occurred.

Mayer asked RAS about holidays, the timeline of her relationship with her boyfriend and her memory. He also asked about the temperatures of certain days in the year 2000.

She was the only witness called Monday. The state continues with its witnesses today.

Two injured in Washington County rollover crash

TOWN OF KEWASKUM — Two people were injured in a motor vehicle crash early Saturday morning in Washington County, with one person being taken to a hospital via Flight for Life.

According to the Washington County Sheriff’s Office, authorities received a call at 4:41 a.m. Saturday for a single-vehicle

rollover crash with injuries in near the intersection of Highway H and Townline Road in the Town of Kewaskum.

The Sheriff’s Office requested the assistance of the Kewaskum Police Department and upon their arrival authorities found one person had been ejected from the vehicle.

The Kewaskum Fire Department was paged and arrived a short time later requesting a paramedic intercept from the West Bend Fire Department.

Because of the injuries the passenger suffered in the crash, Flight for Life was requested to respond to the scene. The passenger, a 32-year-old Kewaskum, was taken to Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee via



Flight for Life with non-life-threatening injuries. The driver, a 39-year-old Town of Barton woman, was taken to a local hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

The investigation revealed the vehicle was eastbound when the driver attempted to avoid an animal in the roadway. The vehicle then left the road, re-entered the roadway and rolled, coming to rest in the south ditch on its roof.

Highway H was closed to traffic for approximately 90 minutes to assist in rescue efforts and the landing of Flight for Life.

Alcohol does not appear to be a contributing factor and the accident remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff’s Office.
