Baldwin leads Vukmir in latest Marquette poll

Walker and Evers separated by a percentage

MILWAUKEE — The race for governor and U.S. senator are in the final stretch and Wednesday's Marquette Law School Poll of Wisconsin shows incumbent Senate candidate Tammy Baldwin with a 10-percent lead over state Sen. Leah Vukmir.

The race for governor between incumbent Scott Walker and state Superintendent Tony Evers was much closer — the candidates just divided by a percentage.

Republican Walker had 47 percent support and Democratic gubernatorial challenger Evers had 46 percent support among likely voters. Libertarian candidate Phil Anderson received 5 percent. According to the poll, 1 percent of respondents said they lacked a preference or did not lean to a candidate. In the previous Marquette Law School Poll, in Septem-



The lecture is free to attend. Any donation of \$10 or more will receive a one-year membership to the Waukesha County Genealogical Society.


